Turning and Returning

fter a fifteen-month diaspora existence, we have returned to our 87th Street home. In the weeks and months ahead, we will turn our attention to celebrating the opening of our renovated building and a new chapter of our synagogue's storied history. I reflect on the countless planning and design meetings considering everything from the overarching vision to the most granular details. We have looked inward to assess our needs, identify our present strengths and deficits, and articulate directions forward. Our guiding star has been to build a structure capable of housing both the present and future aspirations of our community.

This backdrop of our congregational moment is an apt metaphor for the spiritual calling of the coming month. Elul, the final month of the Hebrew calendar, calls on us to perform heshbon ha-nefesh, a selfinventory on our lives. We engage in acts of introspection in order to map out the necessary steps for the year ahead. We examine our personal and professional relationships knowing that these are the support beams that hold up the structures that house our existence. Some of them, we know, are in need of attention. Sometimes, our very foundations need examination and repair. While the High Holidays

themselves may be the days that God opens up the Book of Life, it is the spiritual audit that we ourselves perform in advance of those days that will inform the content and character of the year to come.

One of my teachers in rabbinical school, Rabbi Neil Gillman, of blessed memory, once described the point of religion as the act of building a world in which God would want to dwell. It is hard enough to build a synagogue befitting God's presence, never mind an entire world. More modestly, perhaps our aim this fall should be to examine the spiritual health of the dwelling places we call home and make sure they are infused with values that reflect our best selves.

May this year be filled with peace and blessing for our congregational families, the Jewish people, and our shared humanity. On behalf of the entire Park Avenue Synagogue staff family, I wish you a sweet and health-filled new year! Shanah tovah u-m'tukah!

Transition *at PAS*

Welcome Home

e are excited to be back in our 87th Street building! While the layout of the building has changed from bottom to top, the welcoming spirit of PAS is as strong as ever. We hope that you will come see the new interior for yourself even as clergy and staff are moving in and becoming accustomed to our new spaces.

When you enter the lobby, you'll see the Minyan Chapel. Beginning in November, if you've come for daily morning or evening services, you'll have to go no further. If you have a few minutes to spare before a class, meeting, or school pickup, relax in the lobby lounge and enjoy a cup of coffee. Walk in further, and you'll see the glass-enclosed staircase leading to the upper floors.

On the second floor, you'll find clergy and staff offices and several meeting rooms. Stop by the second floor to visit the rabbis and cantors and the music, administration, and education staff. Continuing to the third floor, you'll see the large multi-purpose event space with a double height ceiling and views of Madison Avenue. When the wooden wall at the far end slides open, it reveals the ark for the Torah scrolls, and the room becomes a chapel. The three classrooms on the third floor also house the PAS Library collection. On the fourth floor are the Youth Lounge, Music Room, and offices for development and accounting staff. There is also a classroom and several multi-purpose meeting rooms. On the fifth and sixth floors, the PASECC is moving

into renovated spaces, including an expanded rooftop playground.

As an alternative to walking down the stairs, you can return to the first floor in one of the two coordinated elevators. Once you're back in the lobby, you will see the staircase leading to the lower level, with a totally refurbished kitchen and handsomely redesigned event spaces. A light well, an open shaft at the side of the staircase, brings sunlight into the lower level. The light well features an arrangement of the Gottlieb stained glass windows that echoes their original placement on the outside of the building in 1954. Our caterers will serve community and member events in the ballrooms, and our lower level High Holiday services will take place in this space.

We look forward to welcoming you home to 87th Street this fall and can't wait to show you around!

-Va-yikra (Leviticus) 23:40

Sukkot begins on Sunday evening, October 13.

e wave the lulav every day during the week of Sukkot, except on Shabbat. Enhance your celebration of the holiday with a lulav and etrog set from Israel. Each set includes an *etrog* (fruit of the hadar), a *lulav* (palm), *hadassim* (myrtle, leafy trees), *aravot* (willows), as well as a holder and rings woven of palm to hold the branches together.

rica Friedman is proud to be a link in the chain of tradition and innovation at Park Avenue Synagogue. Her involvement in the synagogue emerged out of her sense of family — fulfilling her role as a parent while carrying out her legacy as a daughter and granddaughter.

Erica and David joined PAS as a young family because they were looking for a Conservative synagogue near their home. When their daughter Halle, now 21, started in the Congregational School, Erica saw that other families shared a community, and she wanted hers to be part of it. She volunteered to help organize Shabbat dinners and work on other events like the Hanukkah Book & Gift Fair and Vicki K. Wimpfheimer Mitzvah Day. She became co-chair of the Congregational School Parents Association and served for five vears when daughter Halle and sons Edward, now 18, and Douglas, now

15, were in the school. When the children became teens, Erica moved on to involvement with the teen program, and then Adult Education serving as co-chair of the Shabbaton planning committee. She is currently co-chair of the Adult Education Committee and serves on the Board of Trustees. "Putting yourself out there and volunteering works," she said. "You start with a small project, and soon you've found yourself an incredible community."

While supporting the learning of others, Erica has also been an active learner herself. She was in the first cohort of Melton students at PAS and has continued taking Adult Education classes. Erica likes looking at Torah with fresh perspective, including that she often sees it as a parenting guide. She has a particular love for Psalm 114, a favorite of her mother's and grandfather's, and emphasizing certain verses with her sisters at the seder is especially meaningful to her.

Erica has served on several clergy and staff search committees and co-chaired Rabbi Zuckerman's installation, helping to create the transformation of the old 87th Street building into Asbury Park for a festive celebration before Selihot services. She also co-chaired the rollout of Siddur Ley Shalem when the congregation switched to the new prayer book in spring 2016. More recently, Erica has been involved in the "What Matters" initiative of the Caring Network. More than any congregational milestones, Erica's most vivid memories of PAS are of her kids' achievements: Halle competing in the Bible tournament at JTS, Edward singing and davening from the bimah, and Douglas reading Torah at his bar mitzvah.

Coming Home

ver a 2,000-year period the Jewish people's route back to our homeland has taken many twists and turns, some tragic and others transcendent. What prepared us for this long road was our people's initial experience of exile and return after the destruction of the first Temple in 586 BCE.

During this challenging chapter of Jewish history, our ancestors reimagined a Judaism that could be vibrant in any land while still spiritually tethered to the Promised Land. Moreover, the idea that God stayed with us wherever we sojourned became an everlasting source of comfort, and, equally important, planted the seeds of hope that one day we would come home. Without the Temple, other institutions svnagogues and the home - assumed greater responsibility for transmitting the tradition from generation to generation.

Fifty years after the destruction of the first Temple, the Persian empire took control of the Middle East. The Jews believed that their prayers had been answered when the Persian king, known as "Cyrus the Great" in the Bible and Talmud, allowed them to return to the Land of Israel and rebuild the Temple. The prophet Ezra describes the cornerstone laying ceremony of the Second Temple:

> "And all the people gave a great shout of praise to the Lord.... But many of the older priests and Levites and family heads, who had seen

the former Temple, wept aloud when they saw the foundation of this Temple being laid, while many others shouted for joy. No one could distinguish the sound of the shouts of joy from the sound of weeping." (Ezra 3:11–13)

We learn from this text that coming home evoked a wide range of emotions. Those who had experienced displacement mourned what had been lost. Alongside them, Jews who focused on the enormity of their unimaginable return to Jerusalem broadcast their excitement not just about this moment but also what the future would bring.

At moments of transition, sorrow and joy, memories and dreams are intertwined as we appreciate the present and begin the process of imagining what lies ahead. Ezra harnessed the cacophonous energy of the people and created a new symphony of Jewish life that we still practice and benefit from today. This fall our Park Avenue Synagogue community has returned home to 50 East 87th Street. Our renovated building has the same address as before, but it certainly looks different. Like our ancestors who dedicated the Second Temple, we too will have fond memories of the past that will endure alongside our dreams about the newest chapter in our communal

Whether on the PAS campus or in our homes, the PAS educational team is dedicated to fostering lifelong learning that promotes the best of our ancient tradition and also generates new questions and connections. We will explore these themes in 5780.

Timeless Jewish values and insights serve as our compass as we tackle the challenges of our day. Coming home, we follow in the footsteps of our ancestors and pave a path for future generations.




